

## The Vision: Thriving Churches



**Archbishop-elect Ric Thorpe endorsed Melbourne Anglican Foundation’s Church Planting and Revitalisation appeal.**

## The Plan: 30x30x30

The Anglican Diocese of Melbourne has set an ambitious goal to establish a thriving, gospel-centred church in every locality across Melbourne and Geelong by 2030. Canon for Church Planting Rev Breeana Mills says momentum is already building, with new communities forming and people coming to faith.

With Melbourne’s population expected to grow by one million by the end of the decade, Mills says the church must respond boldly. Many congregations are still recovering from COVID-19, while rapidly expanding suburbs lack local faith communities. “There are simply too few churches to meet the needs of our growing city,” she says.



The diocese’s plan focuses on planting new churches and revitalising existing ones, ensuring they are rooted in the Gospel and connected to their neighbourhoods. Mills urges Anglicans to participate through prayer, service or giving, inviting support for the Melbourne Anglican Foundation’s church-planting appeal.

# Snapshots of what makes a Church-Planter tick...



## A New Season of Church Growth across Melbourne

**A North Richmond minister has shared her vision for a new season of church growth across Melbourne and Geelong, highlighting the need for vibrant, community-centred congregations in rapidly changing suburbs.**

Serving at St Matthias, North Richmond, where Cantonese, Mandarin and English are spoken each Sunday, the Reverend Liz Webster is working simultaneously on church revitalisation and planting. Her focus is launching a new English-language congregation to reach a neighbourhood whose demographics have shifted significantly in recent years.

"Victoria Street brings together every walk of life," she said, noting the stark contrast between the housing towers to the south and the increasingly gentrified streets to the north. "My heart is to see that diversity reflected in our church community, and to see people come to know Jesus."

With Richmond home to tens of thousands of residents but few thriving churches, she hopes to cultivate a congregation deeply rooted in its local context. A healthy church plant, she says, is one that understands community needs and responds with practical care as well as spiritual support.

Embracing the diocesan vision to plant 30 new churches and revitalise 30 more by 2030, she believes Melbourne's future could be transformed by churches of all traditions working together. "People come to know God in different ways. We need diversity – in leaders, languages and styles – if we want to reach our whole city."

Funded in part by the Melbourne Anglican Foundation, she acknowledges the rarity of such support for new church planters. "With the whole church behind us – in prayer and generosity – we can plant more, reach more and revive more."



## Revival Begins in Every Neighbourhood

**Church planting, according to Rev Canon Ben Wong of the TIMA Anglican Parish (Bulleen, Templestowe, Greythorne), sits at the heart of the Christian mission. "Jesus calls us to make disciples of all nations," he says, noting that Melbourne's cultural and linguistic diversity makes localised ministry not just helpful – but essential.**

Ben believes new churches are vital for reaching communities. While long-standing parishes may continue serving those who share their heritage and traditions, newly planted congregations can engage migrants, younger generations, and emerging cultures. "Side by side, they reveal the beauty and diversity of God's kingdom," he says.

His passion stems from a vision for renewal across the Anglican Church. Many parishes, he observes, face dwindling attendance but still occupy prime locations in the heart of neighbourhoods. "The question isn't whether a church is 'worth keeping,'" he says. "I believe revival is coming, and we will need worship spaces in every neighbourhood."

For Ben, these buildings are not burdens but opportunities – ready-made foundations for new communities.

One example is the Mandarin-speaking playgroup launched 12 years ago at Bulleen, created to support new migrant families. The ministry reduced isolation, fostered community, and ultimately led many to faith – some now serving as church leaders.

To see widespread renewal, he emphasises the need for prayer, partnership, and practical support – finances, mentoring, and especially open church buildings.

"We are seeing it happen already," he says as TIMA is preparing to launch a new service for 30–40 young people, using an existing parish site.



## A New Congregation Into Melbourne's Foothills

**City on a Hill Melbourne East is preparing to launch a new church in the foothills of the Dandenong Ranges, marking the latest chapter in the movement's commitment to planting "churches that plant churches."**

Lead Pastor Rev Nick Combs helped establish City on a Hill's eastern congregation in October 2017. "It was an exciting, uncertain step," he recalls, "but God has been faithful. He gathered unchurched, de-churched, and people giving church one last chance." Despite the challenges of COVID-19, the young church grew steadily, drawing young families and professionals who embraced its mission.

Now, that same congregation is sending out a new church led by Patrick and Carly Donohoe. "We bought a house in the foothills and felt God putting it on our hearts to reach our local area," Patrick says. The new church hopes to launch late 2025, with a growing team already meeting, praying, fasting, and searching for a venue. "We're excited to see what the Lord does."

Donohue admits leaving their home church is difficult. "The easy option would be to stay. The hard option is to go – but the gospel calls us to be sent."

For Combs, multiplying churches is a sign of health. "Every church started as a church plant. Jesus promised he would build his church, and he's still doing it."

City on a Hill's ministry has already changed lives. Rob, a successful eastern suburbs professional who rediscovered a memory of his Christian maths teacher. Years later, searching for meaning, he contacted the teacher – who pointed him to City on a Hill Melbourne East. Rob was visited, became a Christian, and was baptised.

"We want to see people go from death to life," Combs says. "The harvest is plentiful. We simply want to join Jesus in the work he's already doing."
